This has been another great year, that saw Friends of the Family increasing the services provided to people affected by violence and homelessness. In 2018-2019, Friends of the Family:

1. Doubled the number of human trafficking survivors served, for the third consecutive year. 2. Increased the number of people we were able to place into stable housing in all of our housing programs. 3. Provided over 17,000 nights of safety through our shelter and rental assistance programs.

## LETTER FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

These numbers sound amazing, and they are. They are a testament to the tremendous impact our hard-working

# 17, 314 SHELTER 17,314 nights of safety provided to adults and children fleeing violence.

**HUMAN TRAFFICKING** 72 sex trafficking + 4 labor trafficking + 7 survivors of other victimization (sexual abuse, domestic violence) = 83 human trafficking survivors served. 121 human trafficking prevention and awareness presentations were provided to 5,753 individuals. Presentations completed in 13 counties (93%) of our services region.

198 HOUSING 198 people served in HUD programs, with 96% exited to permanent 960 housing; averaging 25 days from homeless to housed.

5,516 crisis calls received. 100% of domestic violence callers who screened lethal were provided safe shelter. 56% of callers identified as victim/survivor.

2,183 students educated. Students averaged 41% increase of understanding that sexual abuse perpetrators are not usually strangers, but are typically 0/\_\_\_\_\_ someone the family knows and trusts. 26% students increased understanding that bystanders can and should safely intervene when they witness bullying.






